

Careers

This term year 10 students have been receiving some vital information to help prepare them for the choices they will need to make regarding what they do when they leave school.

All students are being given access to 'Kudos', an online careers advice program that they can access on the internet at school and at home. the program allows them to explore suitable careers that they might be interested in based on their likes and dislikes and specific subjects they have a passion for. Students are also being supported to create an account on the national apprenticeships website. this will allow them to find apprenticeship vacancies next year and apply for any that they are interested in.



t o coincide with this training, all year 10 students are being given a 1 hour meeting with a qualified careers guidance adviser. during the meeting students are supported with impartial advice and guidance about what suitable options are available to them when they leave school, they are provided with an action plan as part of the meeting that will help work towards their goals.

ATT Teaching Awards

To celebrate excellence in teaching, 22 teachers have received recognition for their outstanding achievements at Academy Transformation (our) Trust's second annual Teaching Awards held in Birmingham.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME UPDATED INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. the parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. the Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who are absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. if the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. if the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Attendance, Compliance and enforcement Service of Warwickshire County Council.

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means each parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty notices.

Your child's progress academically as well as socially is our shared priority

What to do if...

Students have an appointment (doctor, dentist, hospital etc.)

We expect all non-emergency medical, dental or optician appointments to be booked outside of school hours. if this cannot be done, please try to book the appointment so that your child can complete most of their school day as normal. Parents or Guardians MUST either: -

- Write a note (on paper or in the student's planner)
- Send in a copy of the appointment letter/card or
- Inform attendance of an upcoming appointment.

ensure that you make it clear what time you are collecting your child, or that they can make their own way to the appointment and what time you expect them to return to school. if school have not been advised of an appointment, reception will call parents/guardian to confirm and children will not be allowed to leave school premises until contact has been made.

Ties are available to buy in school – all other items must be purchased online. once a year we will host a sales event for our uniform supplier, Anglia Sports and Schoolwear, who will sell uniform in the tQeA dining hall. This summer it will be on Monday 24th July 2017 between 1pm-5pm and everyone is welcome to come along and buy the uniform they need for students.

If you are unable to make it to the sales event in school, here is some useful information about ordering online: -
