Dear Parents/Carers,

In what has been a monumental half-term for TQEA and our community, I want to start this edition of the newsletter by thanking all of you for your unwavering support in helping our children learn at this time. I am proud of how we have pulled together as a community to deliver very high quality remote learning and pastoral care. Students are making good progress and we have been able to find ingenious ways of delivering all aspects of our curriculum whether it be in literacy, numeracy, science, humanities, technology, sports and the arts. As a result of our partnership we have seen extraordinary numbers of students attending lessons for 100% of the time and participation rates which have hit the heights of 97%. Compared to other academies nationally these figures are outstanding! This could not have been possible without the dedicated support of our wonderful parents and carers. You have been amazing!

Our parent/carer consultation about the proposal to change the school day has now closed. We will reply to all parents who have contributed their thoughts individually and your feedback is important to us. Of the 22 replies to the consultation, 14 parents were very firmly in favour of the change of day with 5 parents being broadly in favour provided certain concerns could be ameliorated. 3 parents were firmly against the idea. A concern that was raised was that the proposed model would lead to a reduction in teaching time, but I must reiterate that I would not countenance this and the proposed model maintains the current teaching time. Parents did raise concerns about lunch queues and we are looking at ways we can meet those concerns with a further food collection point and the use of the fingerprint technology, which will undoubtedly ensure students get their food more quickly. One parent helpfully suggested a pre-order process which we are investigating.

Quite rightly, some parents were concerned about buses being able to collect their child at the end of the proposed earlier finish day and I wish to assure you that no change of the school day will happen unless we have bus services fully aligned to take children home in a safe, timely manner. As I stated, we will respond to individual parent concerns in due course. The next phase is for these results, along with the views of other stakeholders to be considered, before the Local Academy Committee review the final decision. Whatever the outcome I will ensure that we keep parents/carers posted.

Finally, we are open to key worker children from Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> February and remote learning lessons will start at 8:45 am with registration as normal. Once again thank you for supporting us at TQEA and the numerous kind messages we have received have really lifted staff morale at a challenging time.


minutes. It is important that you download this app in order to receive this information. If you have any issues with this or have not yet accessed your account, please do not hesitate in contacting your child's Head of Year.

### **Mental Health Matters**



You will need to wear a mask and socially distance.


If a parent/carer comes on your behalf, they will need ID so we know it is for you.

# Is your child eligible?

One of the effects of the COVID 19 Pandemic is the changes to our home and financial situations.

If your financial situation has changed and you receive of any of the following your child may be able to get free school meals;

**Income Support** 

Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance

**Income-related Employment and Support Allowance** 

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

The guaranteed element of Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child is in any of the following categories, the school can apply for extra funding through the

Pupil Premium programme which will enable us to provide additional support

and resources to benefit your child's education at TQEA:

Pupil Premium

In receipt of Free School Meals

A looked after child

A previously looked after child

A child with a parent currently serving in HM Armed Forces.

A child with a parent who is retired with a pension from Ministry of Defence.

A child who has been adopted

If any of the above situations applies to your family due to a change in circumstances and we are not already aware, please contact the school and we can assist you further.

Families who are already in receipt of Free school meals and Pupil Premium funding will shortly be receiving a survey from TQEA to assist with our support package this year. We would be grateful if you could complete the survey and return to the school.



# **Remote Learning participation rates:**

We would also remind you that failure to secure a child's regular attendance at school may be a criminal offence under Section 444(1) or 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996 which makes it clear that it is parents responsibility to ensure their child's attendance at the school at which they are on roll. Failure to ensure attendance may result in a referral to the Warwickshire Attendance Service which could result in prosecution.

This year there is a change to our attendance approach. There will be incentives for the students and families alongside amendments to our non-attendance policy.
