Staff Squats

Throughout February two of our staff Mrs Deeley and Miss Pargeter have taken part in the 2800 squat challenge to raise money for the incredible charity 'The Teenage Cancer Trust'. Every day, seven young people aged 13-24 hear the words "you have cancer". They will each need specialised nursing care and support to get them through the toughest times they may face.

Mrs Deeley said "I chose to raise money for this charity as I have worked with teenagers for 15 years. Our young people are truly amazing and resilient and inspire me every single day. As a teacher I have had the pleasure of working with the most incredible young people who have overcome the toughest and biggest hurdles life can offer and they continue to fight every single day".

They used a variety of squats to complete the challenge like squat jumps, Sumo's, Squat lunges, narrow, lateral and even weighted squats, Mrs Deeley even used her baby as a weight for these.



To date Mrs

Deeley raised £667 and Miss Pargeter raised £200 for this amazing charity, they should be as proud of themselves as we are of them.

Denise the Dinosaur

Denise the dinosaur- or 'what Miss Rowan gets up to when left unsupervised'

It started with an hour outside to get exercise in lockdown 1.0 dressed as a dinosaur. It is now a 'T-Rex Tuesday' each week, for as long as it takes to tour the area, we play music and dance outside to entertain the neighbours.

We launched The Denise the Dinosaur Facebook page which beams Denise's escapades live via Facebook for those who do not live on the estate to still enjoy the fun. People watch from as far away as Scotland, Ireland and even Brazil!

One of the videos currently has had over 10,000 shares

On the Facebook page, we also set weekly tasks for children, such as drawing a picture of a dinosaur and posting it in a visible spot on the estate, or we post instruction videos such as

how to make a dinosaur puppet from an old sock for youngsters to have a go at. We have also successfully named the park in the centre of the estate 'Jurassic Park'.

We have also been doing food drops in collaboration with Humanities Unites UK, medication runs and checking on the welfare of vulnerable people in our community. We have now been nominated for a Trent and Dove Covid Hero award, and await the 23rd March when we find out how we have done!



Resource Bus

During the first week of the January lockdown we started to notice that due to the quick nature of the government's decision to close schools many of our students were without not only their exercise books but also stationary and other equipment that would make their online studies easier and more fruitful, yet we had these resources in the academy building. How to connect the two......and thus the resource bus was born.

Within a very short time frame the staff worked together to pool department resources. Mr Bovington wrote a risk assessment to ensure

that the journeys would be Covid safe for everyone and individual departments were able to get creative and branch out with the resources on offer. This meant that our students could continue to study the practical elements of their STEM learning thanks to Mrs Trewin and the STEM packs and year 9 food tech were able to cook from home using ingredients donated from our partner's Edible links.

The first week we went out, over 86 families came to visit the resource bus and over the following weeks over half our school community visited at one point or another. Mrs Gibson and Mr Armishaw had the privilege of taking the bus out weekly and really loved seeing so many of our students enthusiastic to talk to us about their learning at home and the positive feedback from families on the support the school were offering. the school were offering. The bus, the resources on offer and everyone involved or who visited helped to bring together the community and enable the success of our students during difficult times.



During this pandemic our children have endured the most change to their lives. At a time where they should be out socialising with their friends, seeing family or even attending school to learn and grow has seen them having to stay indoors, learning online and seeing loved ones on a screen. It's been hard for everyone. We are proud of all our students they have taken this in their stride. Here are just a few impressive examples of them embodying resilience

Vaulting into a new normal

Catherine is a competitive gymnast and uses a local club. The pandemic and subsequent lockdowns have not stopped her or her club. Since the beginning of the first lockdown last March, her gymnastics club have put together 6x 2hour zoom training sessions a week to help them maintain not only their fitness, flexibility and strength but also to keep them going.

Even with a change in venue (Catherine's current gym is the living room) the coaches have encouraged and expected her to work as hard as she always has. Throughout the lockdown Catherine has pursued additional zoom sessions not only so her fitness levels

remain high but also because she enjoys it, it helps her general health and wellbeing. If this hasn't already shown Catherine's amazing determination and resilience she also plans out and delivers training sessions to the younger gymnasts in the club as well.



A Horse of Course

The Friday before the students returned to school they were given an 'off screen' day, during this day they were given tasks that embody our school ethos. Liv not only completed these challenges but she went above and beyond, she regularly volunteers at an Equestrian disabled riding and therapy centre helping to take care of the horses as well as being an accomplished rider herself. On the Friday morning the centre had some staffing difficulties and no volunteers. Liv jumped straight at the opportunity to help, she basically ran the yard with the help of one member of staff, this is a job that usually requires two staff and two adult volunteers, she mucked out stables, filled hay nests, groomed and health checked 12 horses as well as filling water, putting on their rugs and turning them out. The horses weigh 350-600kg each and Liv moved them two at a time. She was meticulous with her work and took great

Ediblelinks

The support we have received as an academy from Ediblelinks in these difficult times has been and continues to be amazing.

We returned to school in September in a 'bubble' system with no way to run our breakfast club in the way we had done previously, but we were also aware that the need was even greater. Ediblelinks stepped in immediately to help us provide a snack bag to students at breaktime to fill this gap. From this we moved to a pre-packed breakfast approach, providing sandwiches, fruit and drinks to students in their bubble areas in the morning before school. We continued to provide this for the key worker and vulnerable students throughout the lockdown, always aided by the donations of food and drinks we receive from Ediblelinks.

There are many other ways in which they have supported our academy and our community:

This Christmas between staff and Ediblelinks we provided, packed and delivered 40 Christmas hampers to families throughout our community.

They provided extra food to improve and supplement the free school meals hampers for our families in the first weeks of the lockdown.

During the lockdown the year 9 Hospitality and Catering students were given the opportunity to take part in a bread project and once again Ediblelinks stepped in to help us provide ingredients.

Sonya, Gavin and the team at Ediblelinks are always prepared to help us, whether its treats for students for good attendance or extra stationery for our students, they always provide the support we need. Without them we would not be able to offer many of the things we do as an academy.

Our Wonderful Charity Trust

At TQEA we are extremely fortunate to have a charity trust that looks after our students and has provided much assistance and support from behind the scenes throughout their years with us.



On Wednesday March 3rd The Coventry and Warwickshire **Enterprise Partnership Careers** held a virtual careers fair. The event was held in place of our regular in house careers fair which we hope will return next year. It served as an excellent opportunity for students and parents to view presentations by and ask questions to local businesses, colleges and universities. There were upwards of 40 representatives present to offer advice and information alongside a series of interesting and informative live presentations on a range of careers education topics.

Students in years 10 and 11 were invited to attend an exclusive free webinar, to explore the incredible apprenticeship and career opportunities available for them in the RAF. The RAF offers a wide variety of apprenticeships, which have great benefits and long-term career opportunities. With diverse and challenging careers available in everything from Communications and Intelligence to Technical and Engineering, the RAF remains one of the largest providers of apprenticeships in the UK.

During this term several local 6th forms and colleges have held virtual open events. Students have been provided with the information regarding each event and offered support in registering for them. Some of these institutions have also held taster sessions for students who have already applied to college. These sessions have given students the opportunity to speak directly to course leaders and teachers as well as find out exactly what their chosen course will involve.

have been given support in applying for the Warwickshire police cadet scheme. This scheme is a fantastic opportunity for students to gain an understanding of the knowledge and skills required for careers in the police force.

Students have been made aware of the Manufacturing and Technology Center Engineering Apprenticeships programme and supported in completing applications to this excellent programme. TQEA has a history of students being successful in this program and going on to fantastic careers in the industry.

Students have been made aware of the Birmingham Ormiston Academy Stage & Screen Production Academy, a new post-16 academy opening in September in central Birmingham.

BOA Stage & Screen Production is a specialist academy focused on creative and technical production for the Film, TV and Performing Arts industries. Here students will gain practical training in creative and technical roles including costume design, hair and makeup and set design, to lighting, sound design and camera operating, administration, and management.

Students in year 11 were invited to attend a national university fair. The event was an excellent opportunity for students to find out more about what was available to them if they choose to apply to university, they found out about how to apply, financial support if required, what courses are available and the entry requirements as well as what to expect from university life.

Students in year 11 have been given the opportunity to meet via Teams with Mr Webb to gain guidance and support in choosing the right course(s) for them next year. They were then supported in filling out the relevant application forms to ensure they have a clear idea about where they want to progress to when they leave TQEA.

GOVERNMENT GUIDANCE: ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS FROM 8th MARCH 2021

The Department for Education has recently released to school's guidance for a full return from March.

From 8th March, we intend for our usual attendance rules to apply. We expect all students to attend full time unless in the case whereby a statutory reason applies, i.e. sickness, an exceptional circumstance etc. or where a student is complying with clinical and/or Public Health England advice.

The DfE have confirmed that the following responsibilities will resume:

- parents' duty to ensure that their child attends regularly at school where the child is a registered pupil at school and they are of compulsory school age;
- schools' responsibilities to record attendance and follow up absence;
- the availability to issue sanctions, including fixed penalty notices in line with local authorities' codes of conduct.

All matters of unauthorized absence will be referred to Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire Country Council. Fixed penalty notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire Country Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child (for example 1 child and 2 parents, means each parent receives a fine for £60, totaling £120, this is reduced to the single £60 if paid within 21 days).

Where a Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire Country Council's legal services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

We recognise that some students will be anxious about returning to school. We will work with all students who require additional specific provision in order to facilitate a smooth return.

We also recognise that social contact during this time has been significantly reduced – especially amongst those shielding or in homes with a family member shielding.

If you believe your son/daughter is not able to return to school as they are complying with public health and/or clinical advice, we will work with you to complete a medical education continuity plan. You must speak to the attendance team at TQEA to check the guidance and the legal requirement.

What does good look like?

Government research shows a correlation between low attendance and low attainment. Students who attend regularly will typically achieve higher grades in examinations, have greater social skills and have the benefit of a full bodied education.

Our attendance target for the school is 96% and we expect all students to aim to reach 100% attendance throughout the year.

100% Attendance

This is where all of our students aspire to be. 100% means no days off throughout the year.

96% Attendance

This is around 6 days lost throughout the year. Your child's attendance is below 100% and they should try to attend every day moving forward.

Below 90% Attendance

If a pupil's attendance falls below 90% (19 school days of absence), they will be classed as a persistent absentee.
