#### Dear Parents/Carers

I don't wish to start this newsletter downbeat, but it would be remiss of me not to mention the rising cases of Delta-variant Coronavirus nationally. At TQEA we continue to use the system of controls outlined in our risk assessment, but can I remind parents and carers to continue to use Lateral Flow Testing kits at home and test your child before they return to the academy each Monday. As a result of the rising number of cases in Warwickshire and the government's decision not to lift restrictions on June 21<sup>st</sup>, Warwickshire Local Authority has deemed that our transition events in 2021 will be virtual. Of course, we are so disappointed to receive this news, but understand completely that the safety of our community is the priority. Mr Cope, who is leading on transition, has created a number of virtual events to ensure that parents, carers and students receive all the information and support required. We will still be hosting a parents' transition evening with tutors and this will now happen virtually.

One of the exciting developments this summer is the launch of the TQEA Year 6 summer school from Monday August 9th until Friday August 13th. The summer school will be an opportunity for our Year 6 students to become familiar with their new academy and some of their new teachers. The programme for the week is still to be finalised, but it will include literacy, numeracy, sport, art, music and self-awareness. It will be designed for students to learn in an enjoyable and supportive way. At the end of the week we are planning a fun event and a graduation ceremony.

I have been so very proud of Year 10 this week who have conducted themselves in their mock examinations in an exemplary fashion. These examinations are so important, particularly with the year we have endured, since we need to get a strong understanding of the current position of each individual child and the knowledge and skills gaps which need closing. We will be setting bespoke educational progress plans for each child with an expectation that they will work to close those gaps. We have invested in a subscription to GCSE Pod which enables students to receive instructional videos on aspects of their courses and allows them to complete self-testing to prove to themselves that they have made progress.

During the hot weather we have made the decision that students are able to wear a short sleeve shirt provided rather than a full sleeve garment. Please note that all students must wear the TQEA blazer at school each day.

Can I also make a plea that parents and carers do not park on the public footpath outside of the academy at the start or the end of the day or use the academy car park as a turning circle? This is important since we need to ensure the safety of our students when they leave the site and the volume of students leaving both bubble gates, with the numbers of cars travelling on this narrow stretch of path, is quite frankly an accident in waiting. Please use on-street parking locally and arrange to meet your child a short distance away from the academy gates. Thank you for your co-operation in this matter, which I am sure you will agree, is very important.

Finally, next week is Diversity Week at TQEA and on Friday students are invited to wear a colour of the Diversity flag with their uniform to acknowledge their awareness and support for the celebration diversity and the inclusion of all people in our community. We would like all students to be involved in this and Mr Stewart will be leading assemblies next week about these very issues.

Class Charts is an application where you will be able to see important information about your child's behaviour (rewards



# Is your child eligible?

One of the effects of the COVID 19 Pandemic is the changes to our home and financial situations.

If your financial situation has changed and you receive of any of the following your child may be able to get free school meals;

**Income Support** 

Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance

**Income-related Employment and Support Allowance** 

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

The guaranteed element of Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child is in any of the following categories, the school can apply for extra funding through the

Pupil Premium programme which will enable us to provide additional support

and resources to benefit your child's education at TQEA:

Pupil
Premium

In receipt of Free School Meals

A looked after child

A previously looked after child

A child with a parent currently serving in HM Armed Forces.

A child with a parent who is retired with a pension from Ministry of Defence.

A child who has been adopted

If any of the above situations applies to your family due to a change in circumstances and we are not already aware, please contact the school and we can assist you further.

Families who are already in receipt of Free school meals and Pupil Premium funding will shortly be receiving a survey from TQEA to assist with our support package this year. We would be grateful if you could complete the survey and return to the school.

We would also remind you that failure to secure a child's regular attendance at school may be a criminal offence under Section 444(1) or 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996 which makes it clear that it is parents responsibility to ensure their child's attendance at the school at which they are on roll. Failure to ensure attendance may result in a referral to the Warwickshire Attendance Service which could result in prosecution.

This year there is a change to our attendance approach. There will be incentives for the students and families alongside amendments to our non-attendance policy.

### PA / Low attendance family's incentive

#### Procedure for Non – Attendance

We expect parents to call us each day of an absence before 9am (even if we know it is a long term absence)

If we don't hear from parents within 15 minutes of register closing, they will be sent a text to contact us urgently.

We will continue to call home for any parent who has not contacted us until we speak to them (including work numbers).

A Medical note will be requested for any absence exceeding 3 days. We no longer accept a prescription as evidence of medical reason.

### **Dental Check up's/ Routine Dentist Appointments**

Just a reminder that dentist appointments are not medical appointments and should be taken outside of school hours. Any Dentist appointment taken during school hours will be recorded as an unauthorised absence.
