Dear Parents and Carers.

Year 11 have been hard at work this week busily preparing for their mock examinations which commence with English Language on Monday. We wish them the best of luck in this important fortnight for them.

Thank you to Parents and Carers who attended our Curriculum evening on Wednesday night. The focus on the evening was to explain our Curriculum 2021 approach to learning, which is knowledge-rich. Parents and Carers can help their child by supporting them to remember and learn knowledge at home. Mrs Hopkins, Assistant Principal, also gave a couple methods – such as the Leitner Method- which would help students to drill knowledge using flash cards. All students should have received their red knowledge books and have been trained how to learn using their knowledge organisers. All of the knowledge organisers are also on the academy website as well as being shared by teachers during lessons. We have placed the presentation and a recording of the evening and hope that parents and carers will join with us in supporting their child learning at home. Research overwhelmingly point to the positive impact on student progress when parents and carers work in partnership to support their child's learning.

This week we have seen some important conversations and discussions in registration about COP26 Climate Change Conference. Our young people are very opinionated on the subject and it is clear that it means so much to them. What has impressed me is the depth of their understanding of the issues and the reality of the importance of the summit being held in Glasgow. In a statement of Student Voice I have received an eloquent letter from a student asking if the academy can invest in plastic recycling bins and we are looking into this. One of the features of our Curriculum 21 and our drive on student leadership is the development of student voice and the Student Council. It is very important that our students are personally empowered to share their ideas and to change our academy for the better.

In another example of student power, I was especially proud this week of the Sewing Bee club who have worked tremendously hard to produce drain bags for the George Eliot Breast Cancer Care unit. The social action undertaken by this group has been inspiring and to produce these bags for such a worthwhile cause is special indeed. I look forward to seeing what their next project is about!!! Thanks must go to Mrs Trewin for leading and supporting the group so effectively.

Finally, with Remembrance Sunday fast approaching we are asking students if they wish to purchase a poppy in respect of the British service men and women who have lost their lives in numerous wars. On Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> November 2021 we will be observing two minutes' silence throughout the academy as well as laying a wreath at the foot of our remembrance tree that we planted during the first lockdown in May 2020. TQEA are proud members of the Armed Forces Covenant and we support those who serve or have served.


TQEA is committed to providing our young people with an extraordinary education in a safe environment.



Please see the attached guide to what is being offered and we have also enclosed a copy of the timetable.





## Is your child eligible?

One of the effects of the COVID 19 Pandemic is the changes to our home and financial situations.

If your financial situation has changed and you receive of any of the following your child may be able to get free school meals;

**Income Support** 

Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance

**Income-related Employment and Support Allowance** 

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

The guaranteed element of Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child is in any of the following categories, the school can apply for extra funding through the

Pupil Premium programme which will enable us to provide additional support

and resources to benefit your child's education at TQEA:

Pupil Premium

In receipt of Free School Meals

A looked after child

A previously looked after child

A child with a parent currently serving in HM Armed Forces.

A child with a parent who is retired with a pension from Ministry of Defence.

A child who has been adopted

If any of the above situations applies to your family due to a change in circumstances and we are not already aware, please contact the school and we can assist you further.

Families who are already in receipt of Free school meals and Pupil Premium funding will shortly be receiving a survey from TQEA to assist with our support package this year. We would be grateful if you could complete the survey and return to the school.

## LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME UPDATED INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.
