Dear Parents and Carers,

In this academic year we are focusing on providing tangible rewards for our students and this week we were excited to take delivery of a book vending machine. Alongside our half-termly voucher prize draw and our attendance rewards will be the weekly Principals' reward with students being given a token to choose a book from the vending machine which they can keep as a gift. Today saw our first book winners being announced and it was a fantastic to see Rowan, Jake, Layton, Ella and Hannah all receiving their books for being this weeks' Principals Award winners.

Parents evening last night for Year 11 was a success with a record turnout for a remote event. There is a strong sense of purpose to a Year 11 parents evening at this stage, as it is important for parents and staff to work together to ensure students reach their potential. We know how important GCSE and BTEC qualifications are to open doors in the future and to allow our young people options in their career later in life. We look forward to seeing the progress our Year 11 students make in the coming weeks and months as they prepare to sit their GCSE examinations.

Today we are releasing letters to parents and carers about our end of term finish next Friday and also our plans to return in January 2022. Firstly, we end term next Friday December 17th and close at 1:10pm. Students will be in lessons all morning and will be offered lunch before they depart. Details are contained within the letter.

For our January return and the beginning of the Spring term we are expected by the government to test our students on site again. We would like parents and carers to support us by undertaking a Lateral Flow test on the day before they return to the academy to ensure that they are clear to attend and they will then be subsequently tested in the academy when they return. Government guidance has indicated that a staggered start to the term allows for schools to manage testing successfully and, therefore, at TQEA we expect students to return on the following dates: -

Tuesday January 4th 2022 – All Year 11, 10 and 9.

Wednesday January 5th 2022 - All Year 8 and 7.

A letter has been sent to parents and carers today explaining the testing regime and what parents and carers can do to support the safe return of our young people to the academy.

Finally, our Christmas Concert is still going ahead next Tuesday 14th December, albeit remotely. This decision has been taken in light of the new Coronavirus variant and my wish to ensure that all families can enjoy their Christmas safely. Our students have worked hard on their performances and will be recorded especially for a show which ticket holders will have a link to access. Although they will not be having a live audience, our students are excited to perform and show their talents. It will be a great evening!


TQEA is committed to providing our young people with an extraordinary education in a safe environment.



ThinkHigher then delivered a 'don't be passive' workshop to all year 11 students in their PHSE lessons. The workshop explored passive attitudes to education and the impacts this had on career paths. Students have had the chance to listen to real life examples of people who have suffered the consequences of a passive approach and also reaped the benefits of taking a more active and engaged approach to their education. It has been



great to speak to nearly all of our year 11 students the past week and find that most have applied to their chosen sixth form or college and have a clear idea of what they want to do next year. We have noticed a real change in the attitudes and the focus of students in this position and they now seem to be working hard to achieve their goals. 

Is your child eligible?

One of the effects of the COVID 19 Pandemic is the changes to our home and financial situations.

If your financial situation has changed and you receive of any of the following your child may be able to get free school meals;

Income Support

Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance

Income-related Employment and Support Allowance

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

The guaranteed element of Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child is in any of the following categories, the school can apply for extra funding through the

Pupil Premium programme which will enable us to provide additional support

and resources to benefit your child's education at TQEA:

Pupil
Premium

In receipt of Free School Meals

A looked after child

A previously looked after child

A child with a parent currently serving in HM Armed Forces.

A child with a parent who is retired with a pension from Ministry of Defence.

A child who has been adopted

If any of the above situations applies to your family due to a change in circumstances and we are not already aware, please contact the school and we can assist you further.

Families who are already in receipt of Free school meals and Pupil Premium funding will shortly be receiving a survey from TQEA to assist with our support package this year. We would be grateful if you could complete the survey and return to the school.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME UPDATED INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means each parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under \$444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.
