To provide support to parents and carers in Warwickshire, the Council has been hosting monthly webinars focused on different topics in relation to SEND. The sessions are run in partnership with Warwickshire Parent Carer Voice, and they provide an excellent opportunity to find out more about the support available for you and your child.

Young people invited to share their priorities at Local Offer event

Written Statement of Action (WSoA) Update

Here's the latest news on progress to deliver our action plan following the Ofsted and CQC SEND local area inspection last year.

Area 1: Autism waiting times and support for families:

- More assessments are being carried out and waiting times for assessments are reducing. A new model of assessment has started to improve the process of assessment and diagnosis, aimed at children in Years 5 and 6 initially.
- A <u>new e-booklet with advice for Neurodivergent people</u> and their families has been produced.
- An Autism Conference is planned for later in the year.
- A review of Speech and Language Therapy and a skills audit of mental health staff supporting children and young people are due to be completed shortly.

Area 2: Communication and engagement with parent carers:

A wide programme of communications and events continues including parent carer webinars, Warwickshire SEND newsletter and updates on the <u>Local Offer</u> <u>Facebook page</u>. Feedback, both positive and negative, is being captured using the <u>Live Feedback Form</u> to help improve services.

The Young People's forum meets monthly to capture the voice of children and young people with SEND. It is growing in members, but the group are always happy to welcome new members. You can <u>register your interest in the forum here</u>.

Training on the Four Cornerstones of Coproduction is underway.

Area 3: Inclusion in schools:

Inclusion Framework for Schools trial is going well in 17 schools in Rugby. SEND reviews have been carried out in each school to identify training needs, and feedback from parent carers and staff on current provision captured. Training and further support is now being delivered to each school to help them support children and young people with SEND.

An Inclusion Charter is currently being coproduced with involvement from WCC, school leads, parent carers and children and young people.

Area 4: Workforce development:

A multi-agency Working Group, including four headteachers, is reviewing training and developing a programme of support to improve the knowledge, skills and understanding of school staff, with the aim of increasing parental confidence and improving outcomes for children and young people. This includes the <u>Dr Ross Greene Collaborative and Proactive Solutions pilot</u>, which helps to support children and young people with challenging behaviours. This is going well in the first 13 schools, with around 30 schools due to be trained this year.

Area 5: SEND Local Offer webpages:

A Local Offer event organised in partnership with Warwickshire SENDIASS (Kids) is being held on 30 August to gather views on the Local Offer from young people aged 12-25 years (see below article for more information).

The improved <u>local offer webpages</u> provide information about local services and support available across education, health and social care for families with children and young people aged 0 to 25 with SEND. New e-booklet to support Neurodivergent people and their families

A new e-booklet aiming to improve the information and support available for neurodivergent people and their families has been published.

The booklet has been co-produced with input from professionals across Coventry and Warwickshire and neurodivergent people and their families. It provides a wealth of information all in one place about services and support available for those who are diagnosed or who self-identify as neurodivergent and those who care for and support them. As well as a comprehensive list of services available to support children and young people and adults, there is a Frequently Asked Questions section covering everything from dealing with anxiety and managing impulses, to building positive friendships and family relationships and support for physical and mental health.

Spotlight on Warwickshire Parent Carer Voice

This month we asked Elaine Lambe, Chair of Warwickshire Parent Carer Voice, to provide an insight into the work of the forum, her role as Chair and how you can get involved as a fellow parent carer.

What is Warwickshire Parent Carer Voice?

Warwickshire Parent Carer Voice (WPCV) is the recognised parent carer forum for Warwickshire. Parent carer forums exist to work in strategic partnership with local decision makers (within health, education and social care) for SEND. We work with Warwickshire County Council (WCC) through coproduction to ensure that services are developed and commissioned with families and that the voices of parent carers are heard.

Describe a typical day as Chair of WPCV

There isn't really a typical day - like all of our reps I'm a parent carer so that is my priority. Luckily, at the moment things are fairly stable so there aren't lots of appointments for my children but when there are, that goes in the diary first.

As Chair I currently deal with all our correspondence; I make sure we know who is going to represent us at which meetings and share all the information that comes in to the right members of the team. Some days I am proactively asking questions following feedback from parent carers, some days I'm having one-toone meetings with staff and sometimes I'm attending meetings representing WPCV. I chair the fortnightly Coproduction and Engagement Hub meetings where a panel of parent carers meet with different staff to work out how best to utilise the voice of parent carers in their work. I link WPCV with regional and national parent carer forums and feed into national consultations on behalf of Warwickshire parents.

How does WPCV support parents, carers and young people?

WPCV is not a support organisation however we make a difference to the lives of families of children with SEND by making sure that decision makers know what it is like to be a parent carer. We help them to understand the challenges parent carers face. We also provide opportunities for parent carers to come together and to share their experiences so that we can use this information to influence change.

Can you share any upcoming plans/events?

We are working with WCC on the monthly SEND webinars and will be at the Local Offer event on 30th August (see further details below). To help increase our reach, we are developing a SEND Community Forum to bring together community groups that support SEND families and we are hoping to attend school SEND coffee mornings. If you are an organisation that would like to be part of the Community Forum or if you have coffee morning dates please do get in touch (details below). We are also currently gathering ideas to put together a programme of events and activities in the autumn - if you'd like to find out more you can join us as a member.

Can you share something people wouldn't expect about your role?

WPCV operates independently and is not funded by WCC. We receive a grant

for participation work each year from the Department for Education which we can use in whichever way we think will be most beneficial. We also get some funding from particular projects we are involved with that we use to support our work, for example the Autism in Schools project.

Guidance to help you and your child prepare for September

We know that changes in school routines, whether a different timetable, change of class teacher or moving up a year can be an anxious time for all children and young people, but especially so for those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND).

Annual Health Checks

Did you know that young people aged 14 or over with a learning disability are entitled to a free NHS health check every year?

A health check is a chance for you and your child to talk to the GP or nurse about any health or wellbeing concerns you may have and for GPs to spot and treat any health problems early.

There are many benefits of having an annual health check. Young people learn new ways to look after themselves, and will receive an individual Health Action Plan, therefore building their independence and supporting them to live a happier, healthier life.

It can also be an opportunity for GPs and practice staff to get to know the young person better and can be a good way for young people to familiarise themselves with their surgery too.

Free resources from Warwickshire SENDIAS

<u>Warwickshire SENDIAS</u> (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Information Advice and Support Service) has a range of free resources available to support disabled children and young people, and those with a special educational need from birth up to 25 years, and their parents.

The resources include guides to help you when seeking support from your child's school as well as a section dedicated to Education, Health and Care Plan needs assessments which includes a template parental request letter and advice on completing the family conversation. The team are working to expand the range of documents so it's worth regularly checking back on the website for updates. All of the resources are available to download for free from the <u>SENDIAS website</u>.
