




Curriculum In Action #4


Science Sampling Practical

'Pupils were using a marked out grid that contained toy soldiers representing a population of daisies. The pupils then drew out coordinates at random and then measured the number of daisies using a quadrat and recorded in a results table. These were then used in class to calculate the mean number of daisies in a quadrat per metre squared and then multiply by the site of the area to give













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
